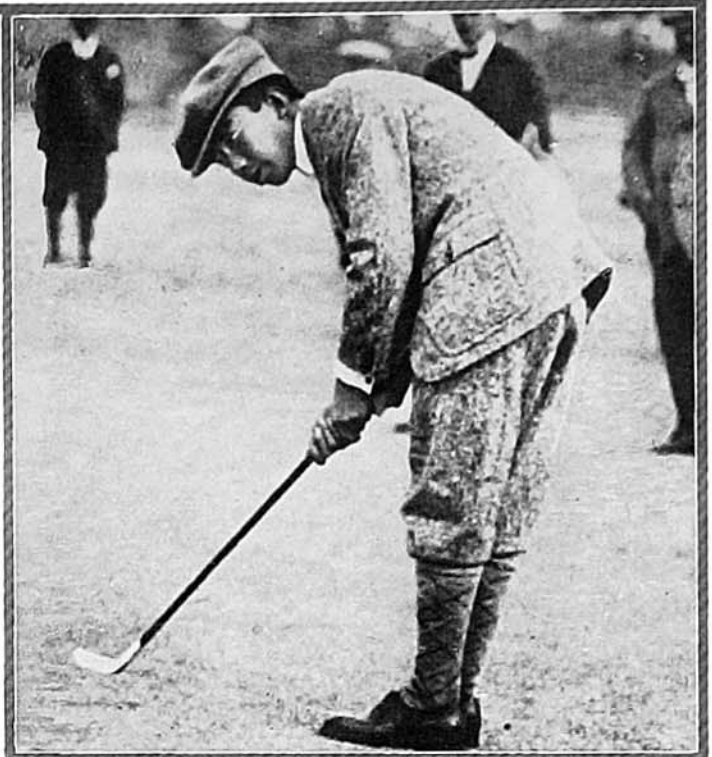

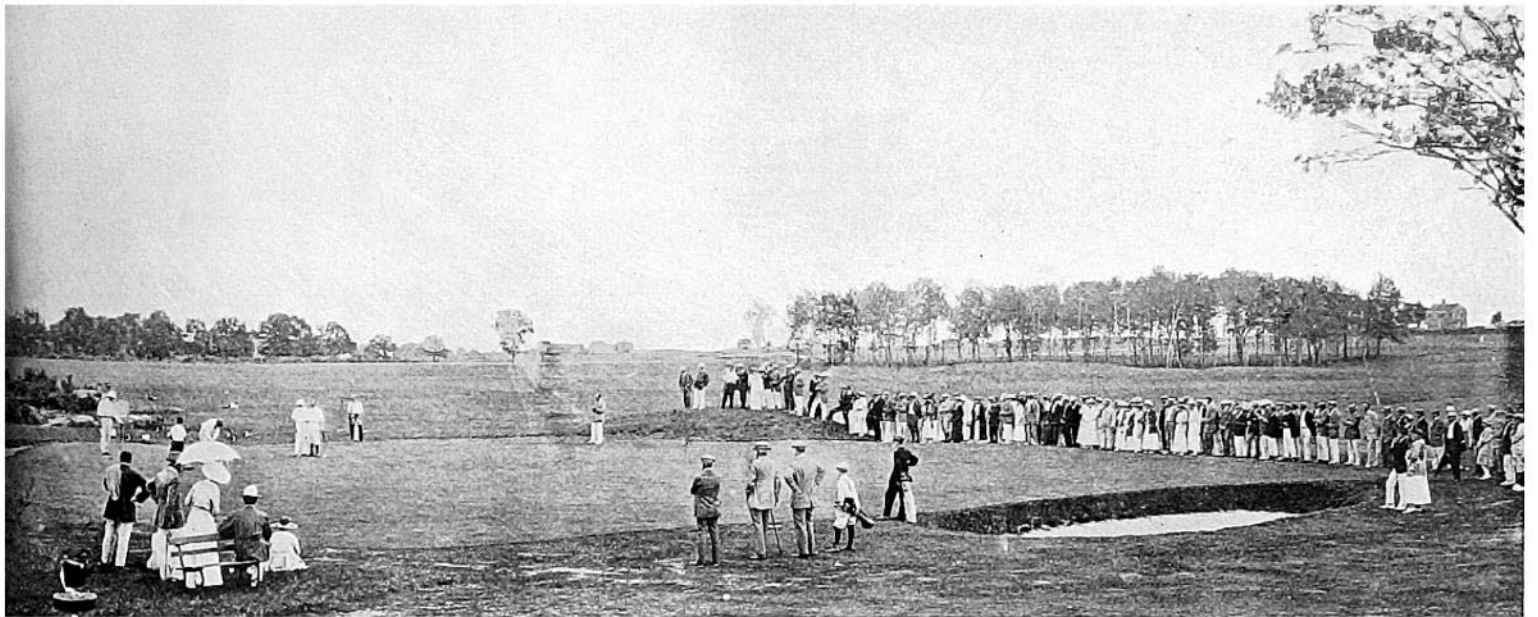

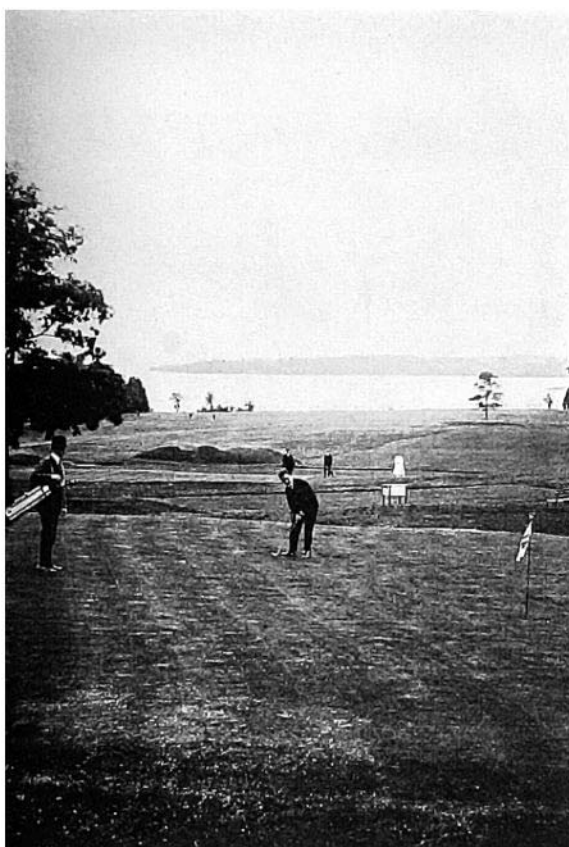

# SOME OTHER GOLFING VACATION CENTERS



Three miles from Portsmouth, N. H., is the Wentworth Golf Club, a well maintained sea-side course, which is one of the most popular of the New England shore resorts



On the left is to be seen the eighteenth green of the Bluff Point course at Lake Champlain, N. Y., which is the yearly mecca of many tourists



On the right is the sporty course at Glen Springs, Watkins Glen, N.Y., overlooks Seneca Lake and is renowned for its natural and ideal surroundings

At the Maplewood Club, Maplewood, New Hampshire, an excellent course, 6060 yards in length, is attractively located fifteen hundred feet up in the White Mountains
